Why study in Coláiste Mhuire, Marino Institute of Education?

SECTION 2 THE COLLEGE AND CAMPUS



Coláiste Mhuire, Marino Institute of Education is a third level college, established in 1904 by the Congregation of Christian Brothers, whose founder was Blessed Edmund Rice.

It offers a three-year undergraduate Bachelor of Education (B.Ed.) programme and an eighteen-month postgraduate Higher Diploma in Education (Primary), both awarded by Trinity College Dublin.

Edmund Rice's radical intervention in Irish history was based on his central philosophical tenet that education is a prerequisite to the attainment of full human dignity. We believe that this educational experience can only reach its full potential where religious values permeate the curriculum, relationships and ethos of the College.

Coláiste Mhuire, Marino Institute of Education is located on Griffith Avenue on land that originally formed part of the estate of the Charlemont family (see map on back cover).

The Institute has magnificent buildings and beautiful grounds which include on-campus accommodation and extensive parking facilities. Blending old and new, the campus offers a unique and peaceful setting for the pursuit of third-level studies. The student residence block was completed in 2005 while Nagle-Rice Hall was officially opened in November 2006.

The Role of Irish in the College

One of the College's distinguishing features and characteristics is that communication through the Irish language is encouraged and welcomed in all areas of college life, including administration, teaching and learning, and social activities. Courses are not taught exclusively through Irish but students are prepared and supported to undertake Teaching Practice in the Gaeltacht and/or scoileanna lán- Ghaeilge.

Language Course in the Gaeltacht

Attendance at a Gaeltacht course is a requirement of the Department of Education and Science for all students. B.Ed students in Coláiste Mhuire Marino, in general, opt to attend a two-week course in the Gaeltacht during the Easter break in first year and again in second year. B.Ed students may opt instead to attend one three-week course during the summer. This option also exists for postgraduate students. Most postgraduate students in Coláiste Mhuire Marino opt to attend the three-week course in the summer.

The aim of the Gaeltacht course is to help students' spoken Irish. Students agree that the weeks in the Gaeltacht are very memorable.

Link with Trinity College Dublin

Coláiste Mhuire Marino, along with the Church of Ireland College of Education, Rathmines, and Froebel College, Blackrock, are Associated Colleges of Trinity College Dublin which is the accrediting body for the courses offered. The undergraduate and postgraduate courses for future primary teachers are jointly taught by Coláiste Mhuire Marino and Trinity College Dublin. Students have the best of both worlds, combining the experience of an intimate college setting in Marino with the bustle of a huge city-centre university campus in Trinity College Dublin.

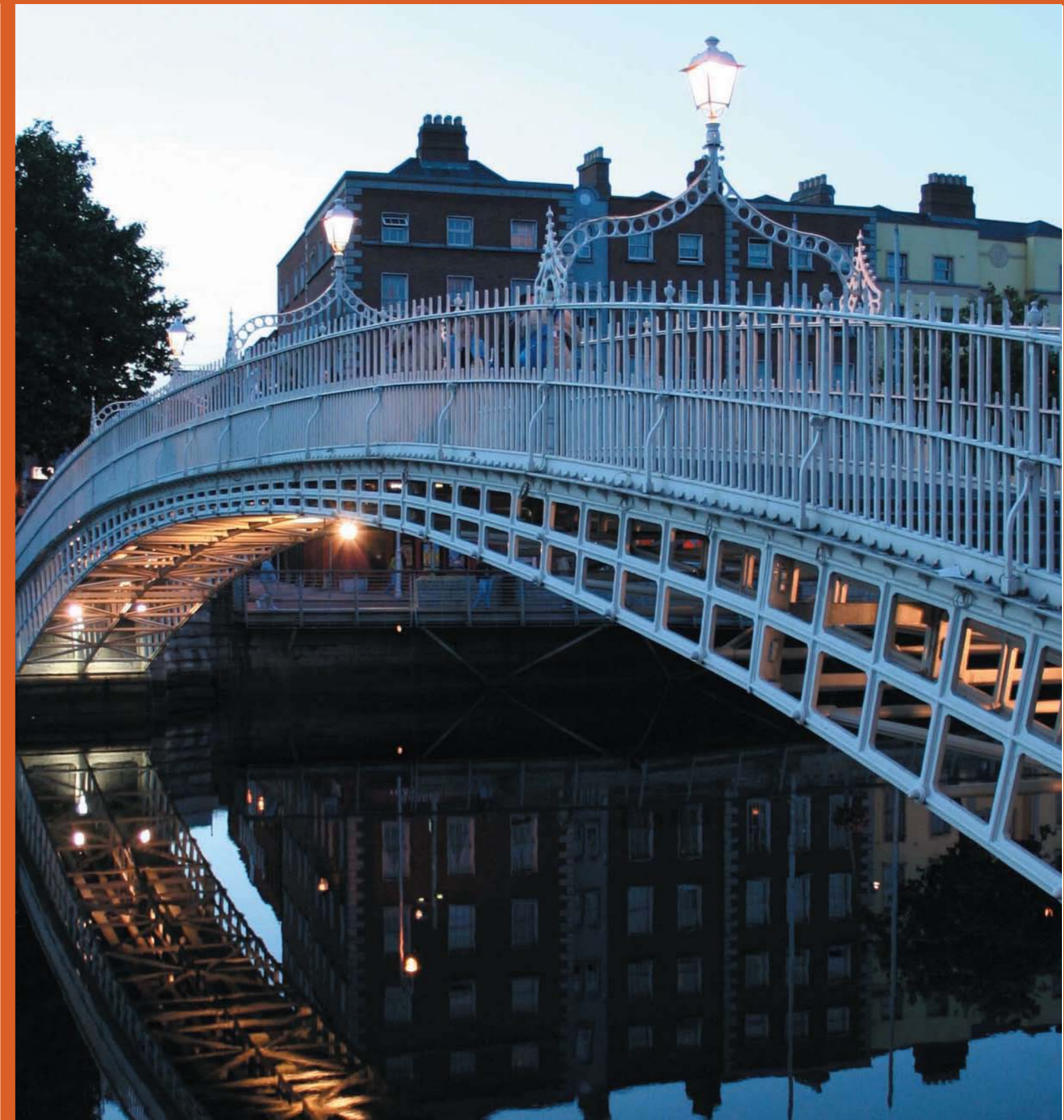
Students register in Coláiste Mhuire Marino and Trinity College Dublin (TCD) and may avail of all the facilities offered in both colleges.

Trinity College Dublin's facilities include the library, a range of sports and clubs and a new gym.

Open Day

This is most evident in 'Aontas na Mac Léinn', or the Students Union, where elected students organise all matters relating to student life. Sports

There is a myriad of opportunities to hone your sporting abilities in Coláiste Mhuire Marino. Whether you play competitively, want to keep fit or simply take part for a bit of craic, you will find an activity to cater for your taste. Coláiste Mhuire Marino is very proud of its extensive sports fields, and its brand new gym.

The College has taken great strides in recent years, winning a historic 'Corn na Mac Léinn' in men's football in 2005, and again in 2008. Hurling, ladies football, camogie, basketball and badminton are other sports of particular interest. As the College grows from strength to strength, exciting prospects are envisaged in these and other sporting spheres.



Arts and Culture

Arts and Culture is highly valued at Coláiste Mhuire Marino. The arts permeate college life throughout the academic year in a very real and tangible manner. Formal and informal arts and cultural occasions occur frequently. They range from whole college or campus collaborations to student-led and organised events.

The arts and culture calendar is dotted with key events such as the recording of Céilí House, ACE (Arts, Culture & Education) week, inter-college residential workshops, visual art exhibits, and student-organised music and drama occasions.

Coláiste Mhuire Marino attracts many talented singers, musicians, actors and artists because of the support and encouragement it provides for arts and culture. Other students discover and develop their creative potential through elective studies or college societies. You will have opportunities to attend classes on how to play traditional or classical musical instruments and join the drama society or the college choir.

A Writer in Residence programme has supported students and staff in creative writing for several years. Arts and culture embraces technology in the form of mini film productions and virtual art galleries. Students can also avail of the many arts and culture societies at Trinity College Dublin.



Library

The Library provides a range of services and facilities to support student learning. The main collection consists of over 30,000 items and is focused on meeting the reading requirements of all students. The specialist collection of Teaching Practice resources has a wide range of primary school text books, resource books and other materials for use in schools. The Library also subscribes to journals on education and related subjects.

The Reading Room is intended as a quiet study area. It has fifty individual study carrels and is located away from the hustle and bustle of College life. The Curriculum Room can be used for small group work. Students have access to networked computers for personal study in the Library. All students have access to a range of software including word processing, data management and educational software.

The Library also provides reprographic facilities, including colour copying and printing.

ICT Facilities

Information and communication technologies (ICT) play an integral part in supporting academic and administrative activities in the College. Significant resources are invested in the provision of computing facilities for students in support of teaching, learning and research.

There are two computer laboratories, including one multi-media laboratory. Wifi is available on the campus.

Restaurant and Café

The bright, airy 200-seat Restaurant is located upstairs in the Nagle-Rice Hall. It provides service each day from 8.00 am until the afternoon. The popular and more intimate Cloister Café is located in the heart of the College.

Accommodation

On-campus

Living on campus enables students to make friends readily in the newly built student residences. The on-campus accommodation comprises 3, 4 and 5 bedroom apartments; each bedroom has en suite facilities and a work station. Kitchens include refrigerator, electric hob and microwave. Free internet access (with a connection charge) is available in each bedroom and there is a launderette on site. A number of bedrooms are reserved for new students.

Bachelor of Education Degree (B.Ed.)

CAO Course Codes: CM001 and CM002

The Bachelor in Education (B.Ed.) is a three-year professional degree programme that meets the academic and professional requirements for primary teaching. The course is taught in conjunction with the School of Education in Trinity College Dublin (TCD). Students register formally with both colleges and attend lectures in Marino as well as on the TCD campus in the centre of Dublin.

The first three years of the course lead to a Bachelor of Education degree (NFQ Level 7). All graduating students may proceed to study for an honours Bachelor Degree (NFQ Level 8) which is a one-year part-time programme delivered in Trinity College Dublin. Graduates usually complete the NFQ Level 8 degree during their first year teaching. This optional year may be undertaken by B.Ed. graduates within 5 years of the completion of the degree. Lectures during this year are held in the late afternoon in Trinity College Dublin.

B.Ed. Degree Subjects

This degree is an integrated course of study designed to equip student teachers with a range of knowledge and skills related to the profession of primary school teaching.

Teaching Practice

Over the course of your three years of study for the B.Ed. Degree you will engage in a number of school experiences and teaching practice programmes. These will be in a variety of settings including urban schools, rural schools, multi-grade schools, DEIS schools, Scoileanna lán-Ghaeilge and Scoileanna Gaeltachta.

First Year

Two periods of serial school experience.
Three-week spring teaching practice.

Second Year

One period of serial school experience.
Four-week autumn teaching practice.
Three-week spring teaching practice.

Third Year

Four-week autumn teaching practice placement.
Three-week spring teaching practice.
Three-week experience in a Special Education setting.

Electives

As part of the B.Ed. degree programme, students are afforded the opportunity to participate in an elective course to specialise in a field of study that is relevant to contemporary Irish classrooms. All electives are composed of two co-requisite options or linked modules. Each option enables students to further equip themselves with knowledge and skills beyond those provided in the curriculum courses.

Electives are an integral part of the B.Ed. programme. Undergraduate students complete one option in second year and its co-requisite module in third year.

Elective studies provide opportunities for students to learn:

- within smaller group settings
- from in-house and outside experts who have acquired extensive experience and expertise in particular fields
- from practical engagement, field excursions or school placement elements

Admission Procedures to the B.Ed.

Admission to the B.Ed. Degree in Coláiste Mhuire Marino is administered by the Central Applications Office and course code information will be found in the CAO Handbook or on the CAO website: www.cao.ie.

Up to 10% of places overall may be reserved for applicants from the Gaeltacht. Gaeltacht applicants should apply for course CM002 but may also apply for course CM001. An Roinn Gnóthaí Pobail, Tuaithe agus Gaeltachta determines eligibility for course CM002. Intending applicants are advised to check their eligibility with that Department.

Age Limits for Entry

Applicants must be at least 16 years of age on January 15 of the year of entry.

Minimum Entry Requirements

Leaving Certificate examination(s) with Grade C3 Higher Level in not less than three subjects
Grade D3 in three other subjects
Grade C3 in Higher Level Irish
Grade C3 in English Ordinary Level or D3 Higher Level
Grade D3 in Mathematics (either ordinary or Higher Level)

Applicants apply on one single Leaving Certificate only but the three qualifying subjects of Grade C3 in Higher Level Irish and the grades in English and Mathematics may be achieved in other Leaving Certificate examination(s) but will not be counted for points.

Minimum requirements at Northern Ireland G.C.S.E. and G.C.E./A Level Examinations (School Leavers and Mature Students):

Irish: Grade C at G.C.E. A Level
English: Grade C at G.C.S.E. Level in both English and English Literature, or Grade B at G.C.S.E. Level in either
Mathematics: Grade D at G.C.S.E. Level in Additional Mathematics or Grade A at G.C.S.E. Level in Mathematics
Grade C at G.C.E. A Level in two further subjects
Grade C in one other subject at G.C.S.E. Level

Deferred Entry

If you are offered a place on the B.Ed. Programme you may request to defer entry for one year, under certain circumstances. Contact the Admissions Officer in Coláiste Mhuire Marino regarding the procedure.

Transfer Students

Students wishing to transfer from other third-level institutions may apply through the Central Applications Office.



Admission Procedures for Mature Applicants

A mature applicant is one who is 23 years of age, or over, on January 1 of the year of entry to the B. Ed. programme. Mature students contribute hugely to college life. Coláiste Mhuire welcomes mature students and seeks to support them at the time of application and during their time in Marino. The number of places reserved on the B.Ed. programme is determined by the Department of Education and Science (usually about 10%).

If you are a mature student you may apply in three ways:

1. CAO entry

Applicants must apply to the CAO by February 1 of the year of entry. The normal entry requirements for school leavers apply. CAO applicants are then offered a place based on their Leaving Certificate points.

2. Direct entry

Applicants apply directly to Coláiste Mhuire Marino before April 2 of the year of entry. Application forms are available from mid-February from the Admissions Office of Coláiste Mhuire Marino. B. Ed. mature applicants who apply to Marino directly are interviewed and must also present for an oral Irish examination in the specified centre. Applicants will be placed in order of merit according to the combined results of the interview and their oral Irish test.

3. A combination of methods 1 and 2

Applicants may wish to apply both through the CAO **and** directly to Coláiste Mhuire Marino. The acceptance of an offer of a place as a result of the mature student competition having applied directly to Coláiste Mhuire Marino will preclude an offer from the CAO of a place on the B.Ed. course in Coláiste Mhuire Marino.

Entry Requirements for Mature Applicants

Both CAO and direct applicants are required to have a Leaving Certificate (or an approved equivalent) with Grade C3 in three Higher Level subjects, one of which must be in Higher Level Irish, a Grade C in Ordinary Level English or a Grade D in Higher Level English and a Grade D in Ordinary Level Mathematics. Applicants may combine results at Leaving Certificate Examinations in different years for the purpose of meeting the academic requirements.

Financing Mature Students' Return to Study

Tuition fees are paid by the Department of Education and Science for full-time, undergraduate, non-repeat European Union students. A Higher Education Maintenance grant (which depends on individual financial circumstances) can be applied for from the local grant-awarding authority.

Mature students may be entitled to a Back to Education Allowance. Contact the Department of Social and Family Affairs (01 704 3000).

Access Programme

In conjunction with the Trinity Access Programme, Coláiste Mhuire Marino reserves about 5% of places each year on the B.Ed. programme. Minimum entry requirements are the same as for all other students. If an applicant comes within a margin of approximately 20 points below the standard entry requirement for the course in the year in question, a place may be offered but is not guaranteed. Successful applicants receive financial, pastoral and academic support throughout the academic programme from both Trinity College Access Office and from the Access Officer of Coláiste Mhuire Marino.

Students with a Learning Difficulty or a Disability

Our policy for students with a learning difficulty or with a disability is to provide equality of educational opportunity and to offer appropriate supports for students to participate fully in all aspects of college life.

Admission requirements for such students are the same as for all other students i.e. requirements and regulations are set and implemented by the Department of Education and Science. You apply through the CAO application process.

It is the policy of Coláiste Mhuire Marino to accommodate all students who meet the entry requirements laid down by the DES and to provide the necessary resources to facilitate completion of the course.

When the College is made aware, either through the CAO or through personal contact, of special requirements related to disability, every effort is made to be pro-active and to provide the necessary resources. In conjunction with the Disability Services in Trinity College Dublin, the College works on an individual basis with students to assess their requirements and to meet these requirements, if possible. Higher Diploma in Education (Primary)

The course is sanctioned from year to year by the Department of Education and Science and is advertised in the public press with details of the application procedure. Interviews are held in arrangement with the Department of Education and Science and the Colleges of Education prior to the commencement of each course. An oral Irish interview is also conducted.

Course structure of the Higher Diploma in Education (Primary)

The Higher Diploma in Education (Primary) is an eighteen-month professional course that meets the academic and professional requirements for primary teachers. It normally starts in late January or early February of the year of entry and finishes in May of the following year.

Higher Diploma students register in both Coláiste Mhuire Marino and TCD. Students attend lectures in Marino for the full duration of the course and in TCD from October of the year of entry.

The diploma is an integrated course of study designed to equip student teachers with a range of knowledge and skills related to the profession of primary school teaching.

Entry Requirements to the Higher Diploma in Education (Primary)

Applicants must have the following academic qualifications:

- (a) an approved primary degree (level 8 on National Qualifications Framework); and
- (b) one of the following sets of second level qualifications:
 - (i) in the Leaving Certificate Examination from 1969 onwards: a grade C or above in Higher Level Irish; a grade D or above in Mathematics (Ordinary or Higher level); and a grade C or above in English (Ordinary level) or grade D or above in English(Higher level); or
 - (ii) in the Leaving Certificate Examination prior to 1969, honours in Irish and passes in English and Mathematics; or
 - (iii) in the Northern Ireland GCSE and GCE A Level Examinations: a Grade C at GCE A Level Irish; a Grade C at GCSE Level in both English and English Literature or Grade B at GCSE Level in either; and a Grade D at GCSE Level in Additional Mathematics or a Grade A at GCSE Level in Mathematics.

SECTION 6 FEES AND GRANTS

Bachelor of Education Degree

Tuition fees are covered by the Department of Education and Science for full-time, undergraduate, non-repeat, non-transferring European Union students. An annual registration fee is charged directly to students. Local authorities pay this fee directly to the College for students who are in receipt of a grant. The Admissions Office in Coláiste Mhuire Marino can be contacted for the current fee scales.

Higher Diploma in Education (Primary)

The Department of Education and Science determines the tuition fees for the eighteen-month Higher Diploma in Education course. The Admissions Office in Coláiste Mhuire Marino can be contacted for the current fee scales.

Grants

Grants are available from Local Authorities to all students. This applies to both the Bachelor of Education (B. Ed.) and the Higher Diploma in Education (Primary), who satisfy the requirements of the Higher Education Grants Scheme. Details of these grants and of the eligibility conditions are available from the Local Authority of the area in which the applicant is ordinarily resident.

Scholarships

Gaeltacht Scholarships and 1916 Commemoration Scholarships are based on the results of the Leaving Certificate Examination. These, along with Irish Language Third-Level Scholarships, are acceptable at Coláiste Mhuire Marino. Details available from:

Student Assistance Fund

A fund established under the National Development Plan and the European Social Fund provides financial support to students experiencing financial difficulties.
